## When little things can mean a lot

Many of the children that our charity helps support are admitted to the hospital through the University Hospital of Wales Paediatric Emergency Unit. Treating 30,000 patients each year, the unit sees children at their most vulnerable and unwell. We know how important it is to create an environment where families feel supported while the excellent medical teams can do their work so, thanks to your support, we were able to provide a helping hand to the unit recently with a donation of iPads.



David Farrell, paediatric team leader at the emergency unit, said: "We're an extremely busy department and as our priority is to assess a child's physical needs so we can help make them well and comfortable, it can be a challenge to find the time to support their emotional needs too. Having these iPads will enable us to distract the children from whatever is causing them anxiety, particularly during painful procedures. They're invaluable and will be well used."

Four-year-old Tillie was one of the first children to benefit from the donation. Mum, Lu, said: "Having Tillie admitted to the emergency unit was a scary experience for both of us. It's hard to see your child so poorly and then having lots of tests and assessments. The doctors, nurses and play specialists were brilliant but it was great to have the iPad to keep her entertained with things that were familiar and comforting to her. It's sometimes the little things that matter just as much at times like that."

# A tribute to Abbie

Clare Smith describes her daughter Abbie as a little ray of sunshine. She loved X-Factor and butterflies and writing little notes to her mum, dad Vaughan, and siblings Rob and Molly.

When Abbie died at the University Hospital of Wales just after her seventh birthday five years ago, her parents decided to create a lasting legacy to their beloved daughter.

Clare explains: "During our time in hospital with Abbie we often walked past a poster promoting the Noah's Ark Appeal. At that point the children's intensive care unit was situated alongside the adult unit and as amazing as Abbie's care was, we felt very strongly that there should be a separate facility for children – both for them as patients and for families."


In order to support the appeal, Abbie's family set up the Abbie Bater Tribute Fund and chose to focus their efforts on raising money for a new ventilator, as Abbie had spent much of her time in hospital on one herself. Over the next five years they organised a host of fundraising



activities, from a black tie event, to head shaves and a walk of Offa's Dyke, which took Vaughan two weeks to complete. In October last year, Abbie's brother Rob, who was a pall bearer at Abbie's funeral along with sister Molly, raised over £1,000 by running the Cardiff Half Marathon.

Thanks to the unwavering support of family and friends, the tribute fund recently hit its £22,500 target and the hospital now has its new ventilator. Clare says: "Vaughan used to read to Abbie every night and her favourite story was "Guess how much I love you", where a little hare and a big hare try to express their love for each other. At the end of the story, the little hare says he loves big hare all the way to the moon and as little hare falls asleep, big hare whispers in his ear "I love you to the moon - and back again". That's what we had inscribed on a plague at the hospital because that's how much we loved Abbie and more".







Before the facility was built there was limited access to hydrotherapy via an adult pool which meant that treatment was only offered to a few hospital inpatients. However, having opened its doors a year ago, the Noah's Ark hydrotherapy pool is now close to receiving its 100th patient and holding its 500th session. The physiotherapy team are now able to treat children within the hospital as well as those being supported in the community, meaning that patients with chronic conditions like cystic fibrosis can also benefit.

Julie, Matt's mum, says:
"In the water Matt is just... happy.
The room is beautifully lit and warm and he can play his own music which all relaxes him. But most of all I think he feels safe and unburdened.
Out of the water, Matt can't really do any kind of exercise and feels very self-conscious but all of that melts away when he's in the pool.

The physios who go in the pool with him make sure he gets a really tough work out but they're lovely and fun and they treat him like an individual so he's keen to do it and do it well. "Matt's going through an awful lot and quite understandably, he doesn't relish the thought of going in to hospital. But the sessions in the pool are different. It loosens the tension in his muscles but it's done more than that for him. It's improved his self-esteem and his confidence."

Senior physiotherapist, Sharon Hortop, said: "Children who face physical challenges because of their medical condition often find they're able to do more in the water than they can on dry land. That's great for us in terms of improving their strength and mobility but the effects are often more far reaching than that. Hydrotherapy can give children a sense of confidence in their own abilities that lasts much longer that their session in the water.

going through challenging times, undergoing treatments and procedures that can often be uncomfortable or painful.

The hydrotherapy pool gives us the opportunity to support children in their recovery in a way that's effective but also really fun. People often comment on how much laughter they hear coming from our area in the hospital and we're very proud of that."

## 2,000 cyclists get on their bikes for children

On a cloudy Saturday morning at the beginning of May, 2,000 cyclists of all ages and abilities set off from Cardiff City Hall to cycle 107 miles along the roads and paths of South and West Wales to Tenby. The event, which this year had Noah's Ark as its chosen charity, looks set to raise over £70,000.

Among those taking part in the challenge were a team of staff from the children's hospital. One was seasoned CARTEN participant, Dr Iolo Doull, paediatric consultant at the Noah's Ark Children's Hospital for Wales and father of Olympic cyclist, Owain Doull.

lolo said: "CARTEN is a fantastic organisation that has taken a seemingly simple challenge and used it to raise hundreds of thousands of pounds for local charities in Wales. They have been a huge supporters of Noah's Ark Charity in the past and have provided important equipment for the department where I work. This year's event was doubly special to me as Noah's Ark was again the chosen charity, and my son Owain is an ambassador for the charity."

Due to his training for this summer's Olympics, Owain wasn't able to join his dad but sent messages of good luck to everyone on Twitter. He also sent a cycling jersey signed by the GB cycling team which raised £1,400.

Family member and event organiser, Leanne Edwards, says: "Brooke, Julie's granddaughter, was treated at the Noah's Ark Hospital for meningitis just after her first birthday and we'll never forget what fantastic care she received.

Raising money seemed like a fitting tribute to wonderful Julie as well as a big thank you for Brooke's care. The family day we held was packed out and we were thrilled to have so much community support."

# Exciting developments at Noah's Ark

Though our nation's children's hospital is now up and running, our work to support the Noah's Ark Children's Hospital for Wales in providing world class care and facilities continues.

So that we can respond as quickly and efficiently as possible to the needs of children and families, we recently launched a grant system which enables the paediatric team to apply for funding directly on a quarterly basis.

Here, thanks to you, is what we have been able to fund in our first grant round:

**A Foetal Ultrasound Machine** which will detect heart defects before birth. This form of screening saves lives and will improve outcomes for hundreds of newborn babies throughout Wales.

**Education and skills training** on congenital heart disease for antenatal and paediatric medical teams throughout Wales. The training aims to further improve standards of antenatal diagnosis of congenital heart defects.

**An MRI compatible DVD system** which will relax and distract children during scans and therefore reduce the need for sedation and anaesthesia.

Creating a **fun, non-threatening and child friendly environment** for children within the hospital's growing Paediatric Clinical Research Facility.

**Educational toys and play equipment** to support young children's learning and development, ensuing that they are able to meet their full potential.

We'll be telling you more about the positive impact each of these are having over the coming months, so keep an eye out.

## Meet Lauren...

Hi I'm Lauren! I am 12! I have been going to hospital since I was very young because of my asthma. I also have eczema which I keep under control with creams. I am allergic to most animals with fur. I have undergone regular check-ups at the hospital to monitor my condition.

I like to attend the new Noah's Ark Children's Hospital. They have check in computers which I can do personally. I have recently had to have further tests to investigate my asthma so I have had to attend a few appointments over the past few months. I have had to do some breathing exercises. The nurse was really patient with me as I was nervous of the apparatus. She talked me through what I had to do and what the test was for. I was unable to complete the physical exercise tests as my lung function was too low.

On another occasion I had to have a sweat test and I also had bloods taken. I have a real BIG fear of needles. The day I had to do this we arrived early so that I could have magic cream put on. I had it in four places - the backs of my hands and the crease of my arms. The magic cream makes my hand go numb. The nurses and play specialists are really friendly and were nice to me. They talk me through everything and make me feel safe.

When we entered the room where I had bloods taken, this is when my panic started. I noticed the big chair in the middle of the room – it was massive.



There were a few nurses also in the room. I was really nervous. The nurse explained what she was going to do. I was shaking like mad!!! couldn't keep an eye on all the nurses at the same time. There were four in total. The one nurses was talking to me to try an distract me, the other nurses was giving me an iPad so I could play on it, the other nurse was putting a needle in my hand and the other nurse was holding my hand so I didn't move. It was all over in minutes but seemed like ages.

When it was all over the nurses asked me if the magic cream had worked and it had. I never felt anything going in or out of my hand. I will always come early so I can have magic cream if I need to have any other needles. My mum said because I was so brave I could have a hot chocolate and a cookie from the coffee shop.

I really like the new building because it's colourful and has a nice cafe to sit in. It also has a play area for younger children. I still like going to the hospital even if I do have to have a needle. Thank you for magic cream!!


