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Elin the mini inspiration

Planning on taking part in the Cardiff Half Marathon on October 1st? Then why not join Sian and Mark Warren and raise funds for the Noah's Ark Charity at the same time? The couple were inspired to sign up after spending 11 days on Owl Ward with their then two-year-old daughter, Elin, last October.

Elin was six months old when she was diagnosed with vesicoureteral reflux (VUR), a condition that can trigger infection caused by urine flowing backward from the bladder to the kidneys. After being treated in hospital twice for sepsis before her second birthday, Elin's parents were advised that a third infection could cause irreparable kidney damage and that surgery to correct the condition was the best course of action.



In September 2016, at just over two and a half, Elin was admitted to Owl Ward for the major abdominal surgery. The operation, which took six hours to perform, was a success but little Elin was left drained and weak.

Mark explains: "We'd done plenty of research so we knew that Elin's recovery was likely to be a bumpy ride, but I don't think anything could have prepared us for that 11 days in hospital. Elin was connected to all kind of wires and drains and tubes and for the first few days, she was either crying out in pain or too pale and weak even to eat.

"If it hadn't been for the play specialists I really don't know how we would have coped during those days. As Elin was immobile at first, they bought the entertainment to her, distracting her with an endless stream of toys. As she started to gain strength, Elin was keen to move around more so knowing that she loved stickers, play specialists, Sian, set up the playroom with lots of sticker activities and wheeled her to the play room. They were the perfect balance of supportive without being intrusive. They helped relieve the pressure enough to get us all through.



"No-one wants their child to be in hospital but knowing that they'll have the best possible care makes such a difference. For us it says a great deal, after what Elin went through, that she never fears going back to the hospital for checks. It's been a positive experience for her in more ways than one and the only concern she has as a result of her treatment is whether she's going to be a doctor or a nurse when she grows up!"

For their part, Sian and Mark say that they are really looking forward to taking on their running challenge – even more so because they know exactly where the money they're raising will go.

Tiny Lives gets off to a big start



Our appeal to raise £1 million for the new neonatal unit at the University of Wales got off to a great start after its launch in mid-November. We received generous donations from both valued existing supporters (many of you included) and others who are completely new to the charity. Families, hospital staff and celebrities alike also helped spread the message on social media by posting their support with the hashtags #TinyLives and #BabiesFirstChristmas.



Parents of babies treated on the neonatal unit have also pledged their support. Lisa Reynolds, whose daughter Rea spent Christmas in the high dependency unit, raised more than £2,000 by taking part in the Porthcawl Christmas Day swim, while dynamic dads Geoff Knox and Ryan Spencer will be running the Cardiff Half Marathon in thanks for their daughters, Gabriella and Netty, later on in the year.

Kirsty Coles, whose baby daughter Annie sadly died when she was seven weeks old, has set up Annie's Rainbows Fund in aid of the Tiny Lives Appeal.

Baby Annie was born with a rare condition called Smith Lemli Opitz Syndrome in October 2016. Although her prognosis was very poor, Kirsty and her partner Tom wanted to give little Annie a chance to fight and for a while Annie did just that, overcoming many setbacks. But when she developed an infection for the second time, Kirsty knew instinctively that something was different.

Kirsty says: "As agonising and heart wrenching as it was, we made the decision to let Annie call the shots and go to her forever sleep. I found a strange sense of peace once she had gone. I felt that I gave her the chance to fight and the chance to stop, when she wanted."

"The kindness and support of family, friends and complete strangers after Annie died was overwhelming. I needed something positive to come out of everything so decided to set up Annie's Rainbows Fund in aid of Tiny Lives. I am now focused on raising £13,000 to buy a new incubator for the appeal in the hope that Annie's short life can help other babies in need of special care in the future. I have given the fund a year to run, finishing on December 14th 2017, the day Annie died."

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Supporting prevention through early detection



Developmental Dysplasia of the Hip (DDH), sometimes referred to as 'clicky hips', affects between one and three per cent of newborn babies. Undetected, it can lead to osteoarthritis and is one of the most common reasons for hip replacement surgery later in life.

Early diagnosis and treatment is the most effective way to treat DDH. Thanks to new national guidelines involving newborn checks and screening for those with risk factors like prematurity, more babies than ever are receiving early care.

In order to accurately diagnose hip dysplasia, babies with potential problems need to undergo an ultrasound scan so that if DDH is confirmed, treatment can begin as quickly as possible. As a direct result of your support, we have recently been able to fund a dedicated ultrasound machine for the paediatric orthopaedic department.

Consultant and orthopaedic surgeon, Clare Carpenter (right),

says: "Prior to receiving the new ultrasound machine we only had access to a borrowed one for a few hours, meaning that we could just scan around ten babies a week.

Now we're able to see around 24 which means that babies are being seen quicker and younger. Diagnosis and treatment before six months can mean the difference between wearing a harness for a few weeks and far more invasive procedures like surgery.

The new ultrasound machine has made a huge impact on our ability to provide the best form of treatment, meaning that children are able to go on to develop unhindered."

When a little can mean such a lot



Quite frequently, children are admitted to the Noah's Ark Children's Hospital for Wales as an emergency. With little or no notice, parents and carers only have a small amount of time, if any, to pack for their unwell child, let alone consider their own needs for a stay in hospital.

Many families are transferred here from far afield and don't have anyone nearby to drop off basic items like a toothbrush or change of clothes. Completely focused on the needs of their child, some parents arrive without even a pound to buy a drink or something to eat.

As part of our work to support the families of Noah's Ark, we've launched emergency parent packs which contain basics like toothpaste, face wash, a razor for dads and a bottle of water. They also contain a voucher for some food at the University Hospital of Wales restaurant, Y Gegin.

The emergency parent packs will only be given to families in real need in the hope that it will give them one less thing to think about at a very anxious time.

Kerry Decaux from Merthyr was one of the first to receive a pack when her seven-week-old daughter, Emilie, was rushed to the paediatric intensive care unit with a collapsed lung. Kerry says: "All we could think about while it was all happening was Emilie. Then in the middle of this intense and stressful experience, where we hadn't left her side for days, someone appeared with a little red bag filled with everything we needed to get us by. We were so touched

that someone had taken the time to think about how we might be feeling. Just having a hair bobble so I could tie back my hair or a toothbrush so we could clean our teeth made all the difference and most importantly it meant that we could do the only thing that we wanted to do, which was focus on Emilie and be with her. It was the smallest thing but it felt like the biggest gesture."

We'd like to say a big thank you to all of those who helped get the emergency parent packs off the ground. Without them, and people like you, who continue to support our work, none of this would be possible.
